Museum celebrates its 10th anniversary downtown

New exhibit and return to in-person programs marked milestone

o commemorate the anniversary of the grand opening of its downtown site on April 23, 2011, the Sioux City Public Museum is showcasing recent artifact donations and its own history in the community.

Just before the ten-year milestone, New to You: Recent Artifact Donations opened. The exhibit features a diverse selection of artifacts from the Museum's collection, most of which have not been previously displayed. In addition to a variety of Central High School memorabilia, the exhibit features an 1893 silk banner from Sioux City's Norwegian singing society,



a bear rug made by Meyer Brothers Saddlery Company around 1920, a Lakota-style ceremonial pipe made by famed Ojibwe artist George Bryan "Standing Eagle," and a paper mache Easter Bunny from Davidson's Department Store. Also displayed are artifacts relating to decorated World War II veteran Carleton Mikkelsen, long-time owner of a pharmacy in Morningside. (continued on page 3)

Last year, the Sioux City
Public Museum received an
estimated 12,032 individual
artifacts, the highest of any
previous years. Among the
donations were several large
collections. The Museum's
entire collections consist of
an estimated 100,000 3-D
artifacts, 3,600 linear feet of
archival documents, and an

estimated 2 million images in various formats.

Return to in-person programs

After more than a year of online-only programs, limited-capacity, on-site programs returned with "History at High Noon: The Sioux City Public Museum Story." Highlighting the Museum's long history of preserving the

region's heritage, the April program marked the Museum's first in-person public presentation since February 2020 due to the pandemic.

Presenter Haley Aguirre, Archival Records Clerk, chronicled the numerous transformations of the Museum from its origins in 1858. Photos of past exhibits, programs, and construction of Museum buildings were showcased.

May's History at High Noon featured Sioux City hospitals. These presentations along with past programs are available at SiouxCityMuseum. org/history-at-high-noon.

Greater focus on family programs this summer

he Sioux City Public Museum's summer programs for children return this summer with a mix of socially-distanced classes and family-oriented activities.

Summer classes

Pre-registration is required for the summer classes. New this summer are STEM-based classes with separate sessions for ages 6-8 and ages 9-12. The only off-site class is the Victorian Day at the Mansion, held at the historic Peirce Mansion. Class sizes are limited; pre-payment is required to hold reservations. Family programs

Additional programs for families are slated; these programs do not require pre-registration. For younger children, the long-running Kid's Thursdays returns, offering adults and children the opportunity to explore handson learning activity centers together.

New weekend family programs are now being offered for all ages. Hands-on History Saturdays feature "touch and see" stations containing artifacts as families tour the gallery at their own pace. Family Game Day Sundays offer activities such as BIN-GO, I Spy, or a scavenger hunt.

Returning to the riverfront on the grounds of the Sergeant Floyd River Museum & Welcome Center this summer is the annual Sergeant Floyd Memorial Encampment on August 21 and 22. The event will showcase authentic tents, camp equipment, uniforms, and firearms like those used during the expedition.

Families are welcome to explore an 1804 living-history camp replicating the Lewis and Clark expedition's stay in present-day Sioux City. Re-enactors will interact with visitors to bring the history of the encampment to life. Children's activities will be available from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. on Saturday.

30th year of Sioux City History Projects exhibit

odels and posters of local historic landmarks, people, and events created by 75 fourth-grade students were showcased in the 30th annual Sioux City History Projects exhibit this spring at the Sioux City Public Museum.

After studying local history, 746 students from 13 participating schools created projects on Sioux City's past and present. Projects displayed in the Museum were evaluated according to their uniqueness, quality, and how they relate to Sioux City history. Unique creations this year included the Floyd Bottoms Flood, the Thorpe Clock, Tonwantonga, Security National Bank, and the first McDonalds in Sioux City.

Because Sioux City schools did not have field trips this year, for the first time the public was invited to vote for their favorite history project in the new Visitors' Choice Award category.

Another difference this year was the awards ceremony marking the closing of the exhibit on May 8 was limited to parents and students. All the students with projects on display received a blue ribbon.



Virtual field trips and programs replace in-person tours

If local schools couldn't bring the students to the Museum, then Museum staff decided to take local history to the students. Due to the pandemic, virtual programs were developed by Curator of Education Theresa Weaver-Basye to replace in-person field trips.

Programs included: Pioneer life program for 1st grade students with a virtual tour of the cabin; "Timelines" for 2nd grade students to develop skills to understand chronology, using artifacts that demonstrate changes in technology over the years;



a 4th grade virtual tour highlighting Native Americans, early Sioux City history and transportation changes; and several high school programs to complement their study of US history, with a focus on local stories such as the WPA and WWII.

Weaver-Basye said all of the virtual programs provided new ways to look at familiar museum objects. "In this format, I could focus on small details of artifacts, photographs, and interesting stories that sometimes get lost while touring the gallery," she said.

Works of renowned photographer to fill temporary exhibit space

orty classic images by Thomas D. Mangelsen, photographs which the renowned photographer himself refers to as his legacy photographs, are showcased in the traveling museum exhibition, Thomas D. Manaelsen - A Life In The Wild. The exhibit will be the largest temporary exhibit the Sioux City Public Museum has hosted at its downtown site.

Among the photographs are 1989's "Polar Dance" of polar bears appearing to dance, 2014's "Mountain Outlaw" of a arizzly bear charaina head on through the snow, and "Catch of the Day" (shown on page 1). Wildlife subjects include American bison, Arctic fox, bald eagle, Bengal tiger, black bear, bobcat, bohemian & cedar waxwings, brown bear, coyote, elephant, giraffe, great gray owl, grizzly bear, ground squirrel, kestrel, king penguin, leopard, lilac breasted roller,

moose, mountain lion, polar bear, Sandhill crane, silverback mountain gorilla, western tanager, and zebra.

One of the most prolific nature photographers of our time, Mangelsen has been described as a spiritual descendant of pioneering American nature photographers Ansel Adams, Eliot Porter, and Edward Weston. Mangelsen was named the

2011 Conservation Photographer of the Year by Nature's Best Photography, placing his work in the permanent collection at the Smithsonian's National Museum of Natural History in Washington, D.C.

Mangelsen has traveled to the wildest corners of North America, Africa, and beyond, for more than 40 years. He is as much a conservationist as he is an artist.
