New permanent exhibit highlights local sports

Niforms, trophies, and a variety of sports gear are featured in the new interactive Sioux City Sports exhibit at the Sioux City Public Museum. The installation of the new display marks the first new exhibit to be added to the permanent gallery since the Sioux City Public Museum's opening in 2011.

"The exhibit highlights the community's diversity and passion for sports throughout the years," explains Museum Director Steve Hansen. "The overriding theme is the community pride reflected in our teams, high schools, and individuals."

The vast array of sports memorabilia spotlights the history of local amateur, semi-pro, and pro sports from high school teams to sponsored clubs. Along with depicting how sports reflect the range of diversity in our community, women's sports and the implementation of Title IX are also underscored. Eventually, the exhibit will include an interactive kiosk. The media components will showcase school accomplishments, individual athletes, and other local sports history. Among the highlights will be an interactive version of the Sioux City Sports Hall of Fame.



Major funding for the exhibit was provided by the Sioux City Museum & Historical Association and the Siouxland Heritage Foundation along with a M.A. Martin Everist Foundation grant. These funds were leveraged with a Cultural Leadership Partnership (CLP) grant for the exhibit design costs and to provide for the security needs of the exhibit. CLP grants are funded by the Iowa Arts Council, a division of the Department of Cultural Affairs (DCA). (continued on page 7)

is attention to detail is what has made Mark Custer such a valuable volunteer for the last 12 years, notes Haley Aguirre, Archival Records Clerk.

However, when Mark first started volunteering at the Sioux City Public Museum's Research Center, he spent much of his time assembling the storage shelves in the new facility in 2011.

Since then, he has focused on developing a "chain of occupancy" for buildings in Sioux City. Using the old City Directories, he develops a list of people who occupied the property over the years. By researching these people, a picture of the historical signifi-

cance of the building can be developed. As Mark explains, "In addition, this research adds to our understanding of the history of Sioux City."

Recently, he started cataloging photographic slides taken of places and events in Sioux City over the years. "I enjoy the challenge of researching the scenes pictured to identify as much of the scene as possible," he says.

Mark and his wife, Kandi, have lived in Sioux City for 14 years. As a member and past chair of the Sioux City Historic Preservation Commission, he co-authored the revised edition of the "Jackson Street Walking Tour" booklet. In addition, he is a member/ choir member of First United Methodist Church, a member of the Tri-State Writers, and volunteers for the Dorothy Pecaut Nature Center's annual Nature Calls fundraiser.

When describing why he likes volunteering for the museum, Mark notes the friendships he has developed and the challenge of research. He enjoys "getting it right, even if it does take four, five, or more times."

Annual car show celebrates 50th year

or the 50th year, the Sioux City Museum and Historical Association will host its annual car show. Vehicles ranging from the Model T to vintage roadsters will be on display at the Bill Diamond Antique & Classic Car Show on Sunday, July 9. The event is free and open to the public from 11 am to 3 pm on the grounds of the Sergeant Floyd River Museum & Welcome Center on the riverfront. This is a Show and Shine event; pre-registration is not required.

The Sioux City Museum and Historical Association's car show debuted in 1970 on the grounds of the former site of the Sioux City Public Museum at the Peirce Mansion. Held in conjunction with a vintage automobile exhibit, the event proved to be so popular that it was continued



and eventually moved down to its current location on the riverfront. The car show was renamed in 2004 to honor the event's co-founder and longtime Museum director, Bill

Diamond. Due to the conditions at the riverfront, the car show was canceled in 2012 and 2017; while the pandemic forced the cancellation of the 2020 car show. Ironically, the car show was held during the year of the Missouri River Flood of 2011 but was postponed and relocated. That year, the car show was held in conjunction with the All-America Concert Band's Ice Cream Band Jam downtown at the Sioux City Public Museum in September.

For the 2023 car show, DJ Big Daddy from Classic Rock 99.5 will provide the music. Big Papa's Grub on the Run food truck will have a variety of concessions available for purchase.

RAGBRAI-related exhibit and events

nother popular event celebrating its 50th year is RAGBRAI (The Register's Annual Great Bicycle Ride Across Iowa). The inaugural year of the bike ride started in Sioux City, and this year will mark the eighth time Sioux City has served as the starting town.

RAGBRAI began in 1973 when Des Moines Register feature writer/copy editor John Karras proposed that Register Washington Bureau columnist Don Kaul ride his bicycle across Iowa and write about his experiences. Kaul accepted the challenge on the condition that Karras make the ride with him. That first ride, which took the pair from Sioux City to Davenport, attracted a few hundred riders. The second ride in 1974 drew 2,000 riders, and by the time Sioux City repeated as the starting town in 1978, ridership had grown to 6,000. Other years Sioux City served as a host city were 1988, 1993, 2001, 2010, and 2015.

As part of the community's commemoration of this milestone, the Sioux City Public Museum will showcase the exhibit, RAGBRAI: It All Started Here from June 17 to September 24. The exhibit features memorabilia such as t-shirts, signage, riding gear, and much more. An extensive slideshow contains images from all of Sioux City's years as a host city.

Today, RAGBRAI is recognized as the oldest, longest and largest multi-day bicycling touring event in the world with an annual ridership that exceeds 10,000 people. With so many out-oftown visitors expected, The Warrior Hotel is partnering with the Museum to host two late afternoon events at The Crown Rooftop Bar highlighting Sioux City brewing history and downtown architecture on July 21 and 22.

The same firm that designed the Museum's initial permanent gallery exhibits, Hilferty & Associates, was selected for the exhibit design. Split Rock Studios was contracted for the fabrication and installation. Local firms L & L Builders and Blankenship Paint & Glass were subcontracted by Split Rock for portions of the work.

Sports-related programming

In addition to the family activities, several programs for adults will highlight sports themes throughout the next year. July's "History at High Noon" features "How Iowa Met Baseball." Humanities Iowa speaker John Liepa will explore the myths of baseball's origins, the early history and evolution of the game, baseball's journey to Iowa, and the role of the Civil War
